# Why do dogs have cold, wet noses?

According to legend, God bestowed cold, wet noses on dogs for saving Noah's Ark from sinking. As the story goes, a dog on patrol discovered water pouring in from a hole in the hull. The quick witted dog stuck his nose in the small hole to keep water from flooding in. The second dog ran off to get Noah, who quickly repaired the hole. Because the dogs saved the day, God made a cold, wet nose the symbol of good health for a dog.

While this is often true, it's not the best indicator of health and should not be relied on. A normal moist nose doesn't always mean the dog is healthy. If your dogs nose is moist but he is lethargic or in any discomfort or pain, consult your vet right away. In keeping, a dry nose doesn't signal illness, most dogs just waking from sleep

have warm dry noses and Bulldogs just have dry noses that sometimes chap and crack.



Many pets hide when they are sick. This is a defense mechanism to prevent predators from spotting them in a vulnerable state. Be mindful of your pet's habits and don't ignore changes that seem different or odd.

#### Thanks PETSMART!

*Myth:* Potential Adopters too often say; "We'd prefer a female cat because male cats spray."

FACT: Both male and female cats can spray, BUT this tendency can be avoided by having your cat spayed or neutered as soon as they are old enough!



It won't be long.....you know Winter is on it's way. Time for some reminders and tips on how you can keep your pets warm and safe.

Certain dogs are more affected by the cold than others, particularly older ones and those with ailments like arthritis. Clothing for pets may seem silly to some, but a simple sweater, or a weather resistant jacket can do a lot when out for that daily walk! In temperatures of 32 degrees or more, a 10 to 15 minute walk is plenty, 32 degrees or lower warrants about 5-10 minutes, or simply wait for a warmer day. A little extra indoor activity will do nicely. Try to wash your pet's paws after your walk. Residue from rock salt and ice melter, even the "pet safe" variety can cause itchy, dry pads and may also cause vomiting after he's been licking them. Melted snow puddles can look appealing to a thirsty dog but they probably contain salt chemical run off. If your dog is older or your home is chilly, a hot water bottle or a snuggle disk (manufactured disk, heated in the microwave) will give great comfort to aging bones. Cot style bedding, raised at least 3 inches off the floor will help avoid drafts. Finally, dogs that spend more time outdoors use up more calories to stay warm, feed a little more in winter months.

We all feel stressed out sometimes, and it can be so bad that we feel overwhelmed. Luckily many of us have a healthy outlet for this stress, like an enjoyable activity or a friend who will listen to what's bothering us. You might not realize it, but cats can feel stress just like humans! Many of the same things bother them, such as: moving into a new house, a new family member moving in or a death in the family. Cats need routine in their lives and when that routine is upset, they can become uneasy.

The symptoms of stress are not always obvious. Some signs can also be indicators of health problems. That's why it's important to keep an eye on your cat's behavior and pay attention to anything unusual.

Make sure to you have your cat checked out by his vet to rule out any serious condition if you notice:

- Lack of grooming or over grooming
- Overeating, or the lack of interest in food
- Changes in sleep (much more or less than usual)
- ♦ Avoiding the litter box
- ♦ Excessive vocalization
- "Acting out" inappropriate behavior

Don't dismiss you cat's sudden personality change as a phase or bad attitude! Think of the last time you were stressed out; it's not a good feeling and your cat probably doesn't enjoy it either. You can do your best to ease his stress, the easiest, most obvious way is to remove the cause, however, sometimes you can't just remove what's bothering your cat. A new baby, for instance, or moving into a new house, are things you can't change. In that case you can ask your vet or you can research online for some methods of desensitization. There are ways to get your cat used to whatever is causing him stress by gradually

introducing the stressor in a safe, controlled manner.
